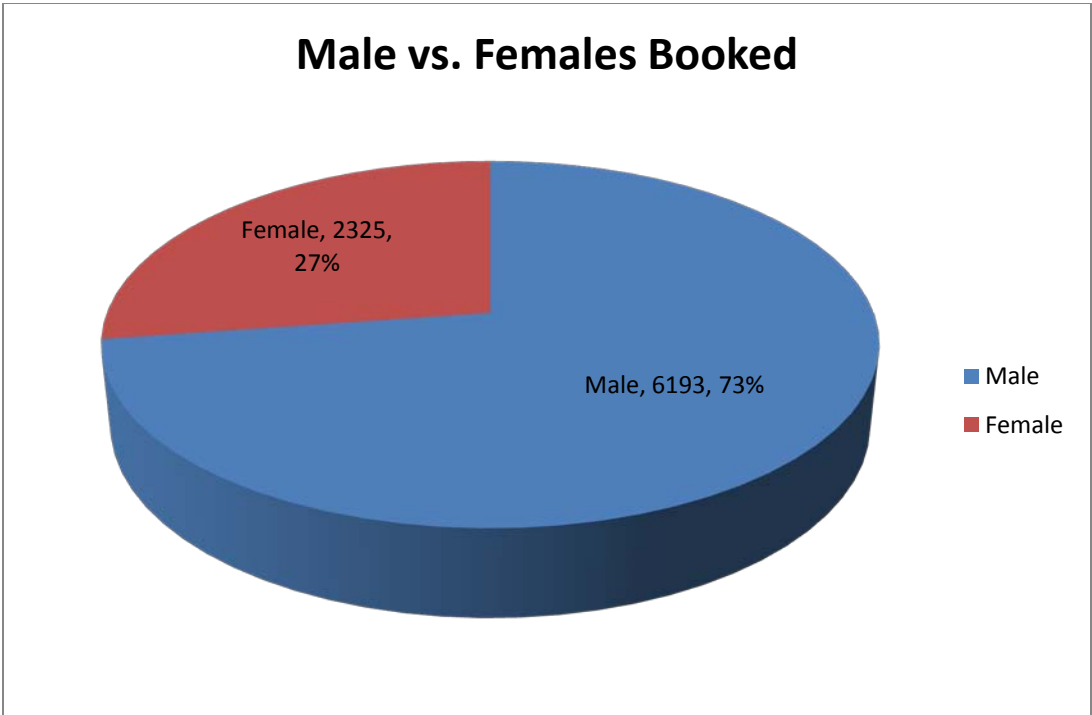
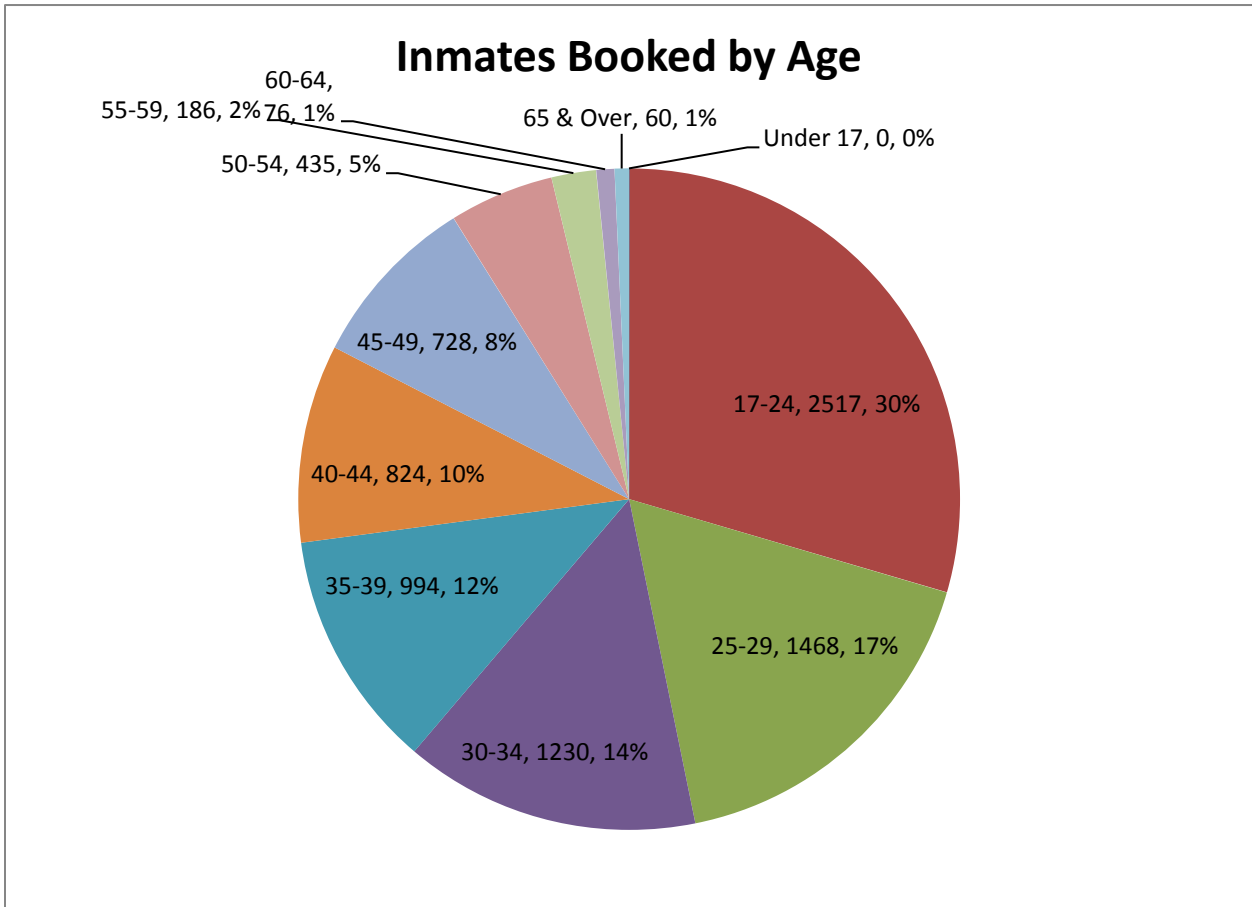
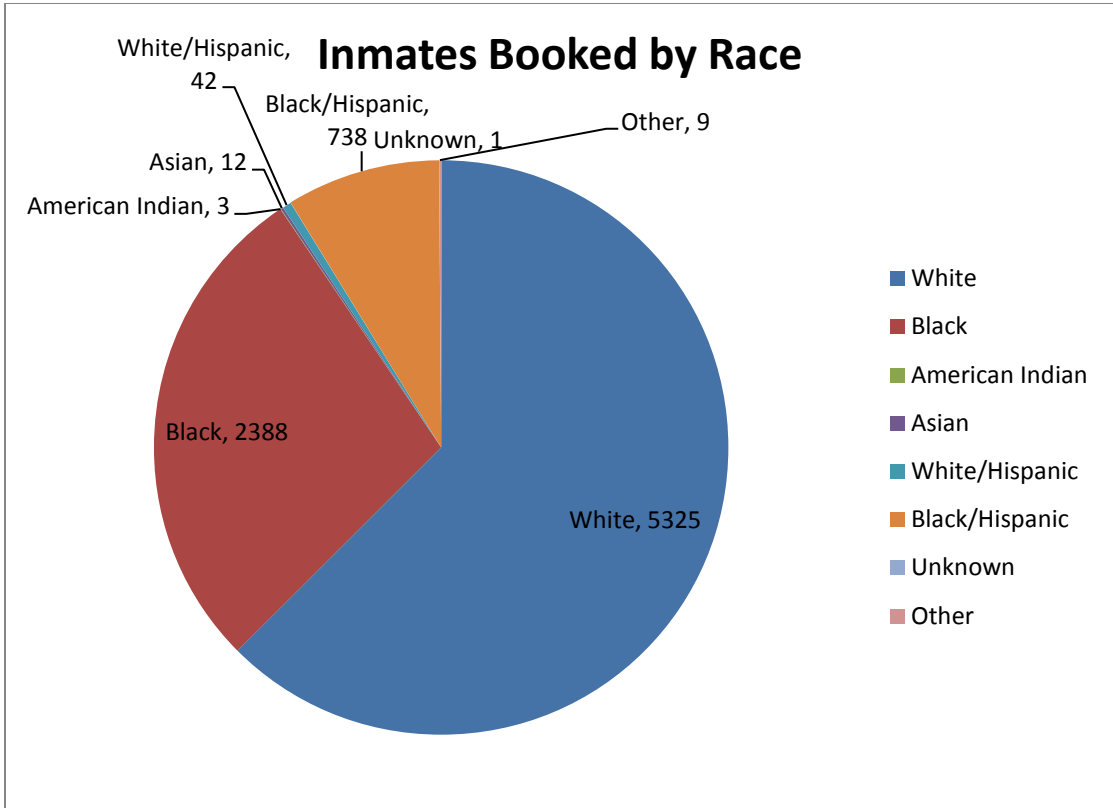


2009 Jail Operations Annual Statistics

Booking Data

The average daily number of inmates booked into the jail during 2009 was 23. The average daily number of releases was also 23. The number of males booked into the jail comprised 73% of the total. Twenty-seven percent were female. Among both males and females, the age group of 17-24 comprised the largest percentage – both at 30%.





Facility Indicators

Facility indicators were utilized to help determine the level of violence in the facility and to provide benchmarks for operational adjustments. These indicators provide the administrators and staff with valuable information that can be utilized in strategic planning, treatment modalities, classification of inmates, training for staff, and recognizing inefficiencies in processes and operations.

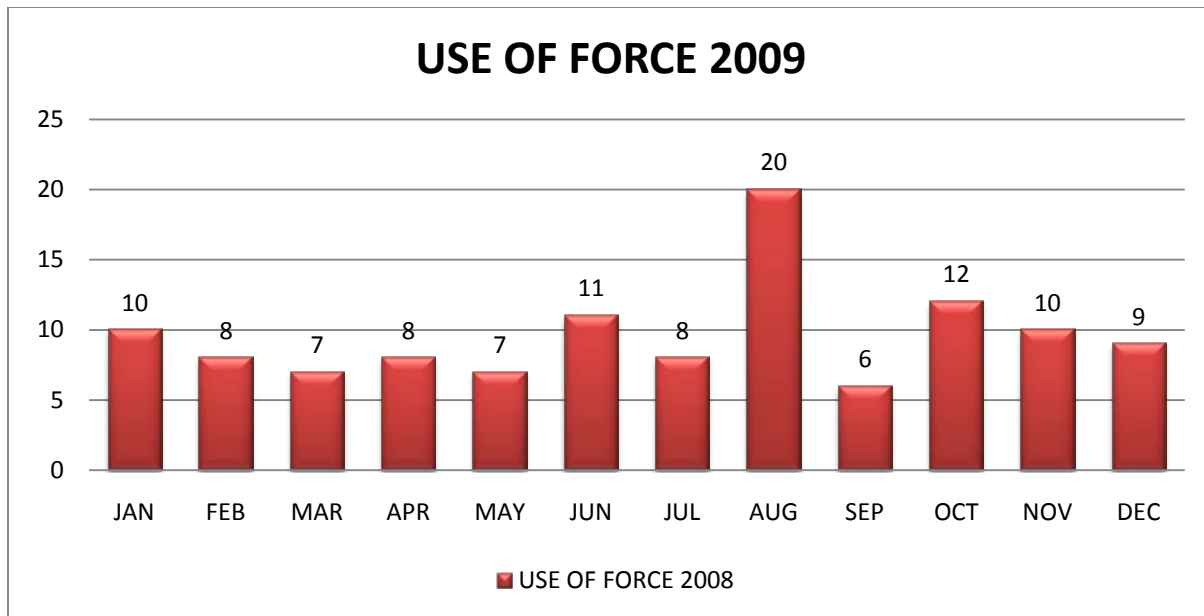
Grievances

Grievances allow inmates to exhaust their complaints about matters that affect their well-being and concerns. During 2009, inmates filed 137 grievances that were logged with responses. This did not include those that were completed for non-grievable matters. All but three of the grievances filed were solved at the coordinator's level. The other three were appealed to the jail administrator.



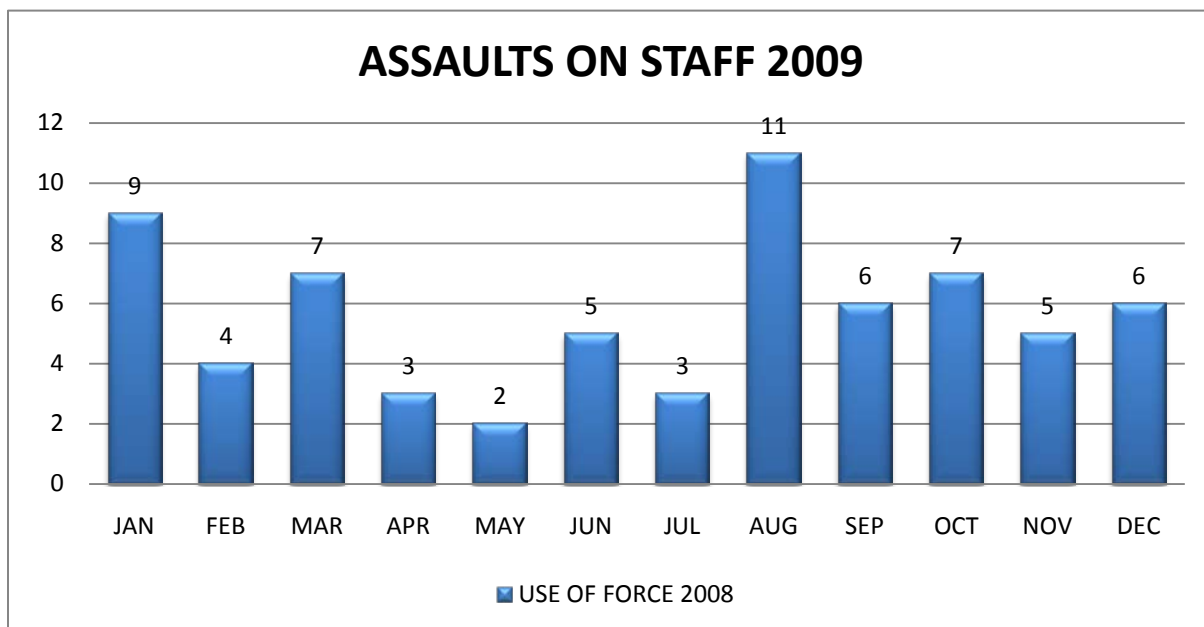
Use of Force

One of the most useful facility indicators is the number of uses of force required against inmates. The need for force helps administrators and staff to determine other indicators, such as structure and discipline, sanitation, food service, medical, and staff training needs. During 2009, there were 116 incidents of use of force. This averages to 9.66 incidents per month. The month with the highest number was August with 20. The least was May with 2.



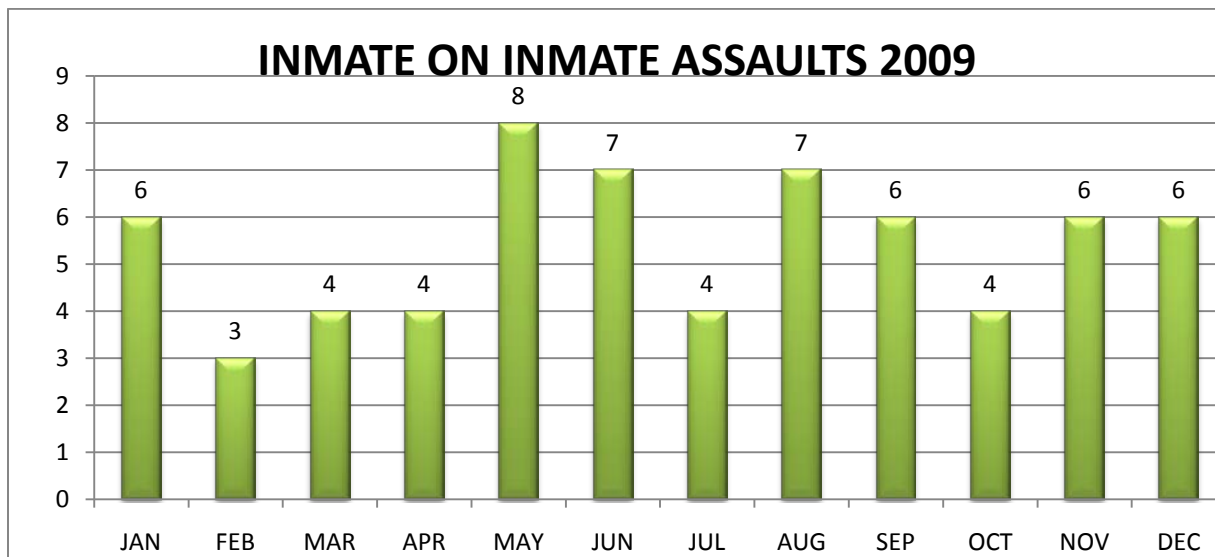
Assaults on Staff

Although security measures and precautions are taken to maximize the safety of staff, incidents do occur. During the year there were 65 inmate assaults on staff. Many of these incidents occur during the initial booking process. The average number of assaults on staff 5.33. The worst month was August with eleven incidents, and the best was May with only two.



Inmate on Inmate Assaults

There were 75 inmate on inmate assaults during the year. These were evenly distributed, as depicted in Figure 4. The monthly average for the year was 5.58 assaults per month.



Medical

Medical care continued to be a large part of inmates' care. Medical services were provided by CorrectHealth, Inc. During the year, the contract for medical services was renewed. Table 3 depicts the areas of medical care and the numbers served listed by month.

Intake Screenings

As in years past, the medical needs of inmates remained high during 2009. Of the 8690 inmates that were booked into the jail during the year, 5,580 (64%) received an intake medical screening in booking.

Sick Calls

Medical received 10,047 requests for sick call. Of these 8,740 (87%) were seen by medical. The majority of these sick calls were performed at the nurse and nurse practitioner level.

Chronic Care

Chronic care patients require on-going treatment for illnesses that left untreated can cause serious medical problems, including death. During the year, the medical department identified 2,016 chronic care patients. Ongoing treatment for these patients was provided primarily by the medical staff (78%) with a physician seeing the other 22%.

Infirmary

The number of inmates admitted to the infirmary totaled 779. This did not include multiple admissions. Therefore, if an inmate was admitted more than one time, it was reported only one

time. There were a total of 1,744 admissions for medical reasons and 1140 for mental health. These totaled 3516 inmate housing days.

Mental Health

The medical staff performed 2886 mental health assessments. As a result, six 1013 orders were signed and executed.

Dental

A total of 580 dental sick call requests were received. The dentist performed a dental exam on 464. Of these assessments, some form of treatment (extraction, temporary fillings) was performed on 183 (39%).

Specialty Care

There are situations that are beyond the scope of care by CorrectHealth. In such cases, more special treatment options must be secured, including X-rays, diagnostic imaging, hospital admissions, lab tests, and other outpatient visits including emergency room. During 2009, medical ordered 3,758 lab tests and 506 diagnostic tests. There were 48 inmates that had to be transported to the emergency. There were 130 out-patient visits during the year that were transported by sheriff's office personnel. There were 15 hospital admission totaling 31.

Pharmaceuticals

During the year, there were 5894 inmates on prescription meds. This represented 68% of inmates that came into the jail during the year. Medical issued 22,349 prescriptions.

Communicable Disease

Tuberculosis

Due to the life style of most inmates, the risk for communicable diseases among this population is high. The medical staff performs routine tests to minimize the effects of diseases. During 2009, medical performed 4,558 tests for Tuberculosis. Seventy-three tests read positive requiring a chest X-ray. No active TB cases were confirmed during the year. Of the inmates booked into the jail, 340 reported having a positive TB test in the past. Another X-ray was performed and 342 were negative.

HIV/AIDS

There are several reasons that inmates are screen for HIV. One is upon admission of risk behaviors. Another one is before assignment to the food service area for work detail. Medical performed 209 HIV tests during the year. Fifty-three inmates were confirmed positive and informed of their status. Of those, 33 received ART for treatment purposes.

Hepatitis

The same reasons apply for screening of Hepatitis as with HIV. During the year, 27 inmates were diagnosed with Hepatitis C and 6 with Hepatitis B. However, 247 inmates were booked into the jail and admitted being positive for Hepatitis C and 20 with Hepatitis B.

STD

During 2008, medical performed 1,890 tests for STD. A total of 9 were positive and required some form of treatment.
